
# Funding and Sustaining an ADSY Summer Program

ADSY reimburses LEAs for half of an instructional day. LEAs eligible for ADSY funding must have a certified teacher delivering two hours of TEKS-aligned academic content. Research shows that students benefit most from a full 6-hour day of summer programming that includes both academic and enrichment content and spans at least 25 days. LEAs providing a full-day opportunity need to decide how they will cover the remaining cost.

## How to Fully Fund ADSY Year Over Year

Consider how different funds could be matched to support different students and different activities to cover a full day of programming. Resources can be stacked in many ways to offer a full-day summer option. Here are some examples.

## What Is ADSY?

Texas's Additional Days School Year (ADSY) initiative provides LEAs with funding to add up to 30 days of school for elementary students. This additional learning time gives students time to expand and deepen their learning and allows teachers time to work in new ways to achieve better outcomes.

# Sustainability

To sustain ADSY programs, it is important to consider the future from the start.



Launch the program with time-limited funds. Keep in mind the long-term cost implications for your program design. Work with district leadership to identify ongoing resources: new or reallocated.



Document outcomes and build local ADSY champions, including parents, students, teachers, community members, partners and district leaders.
